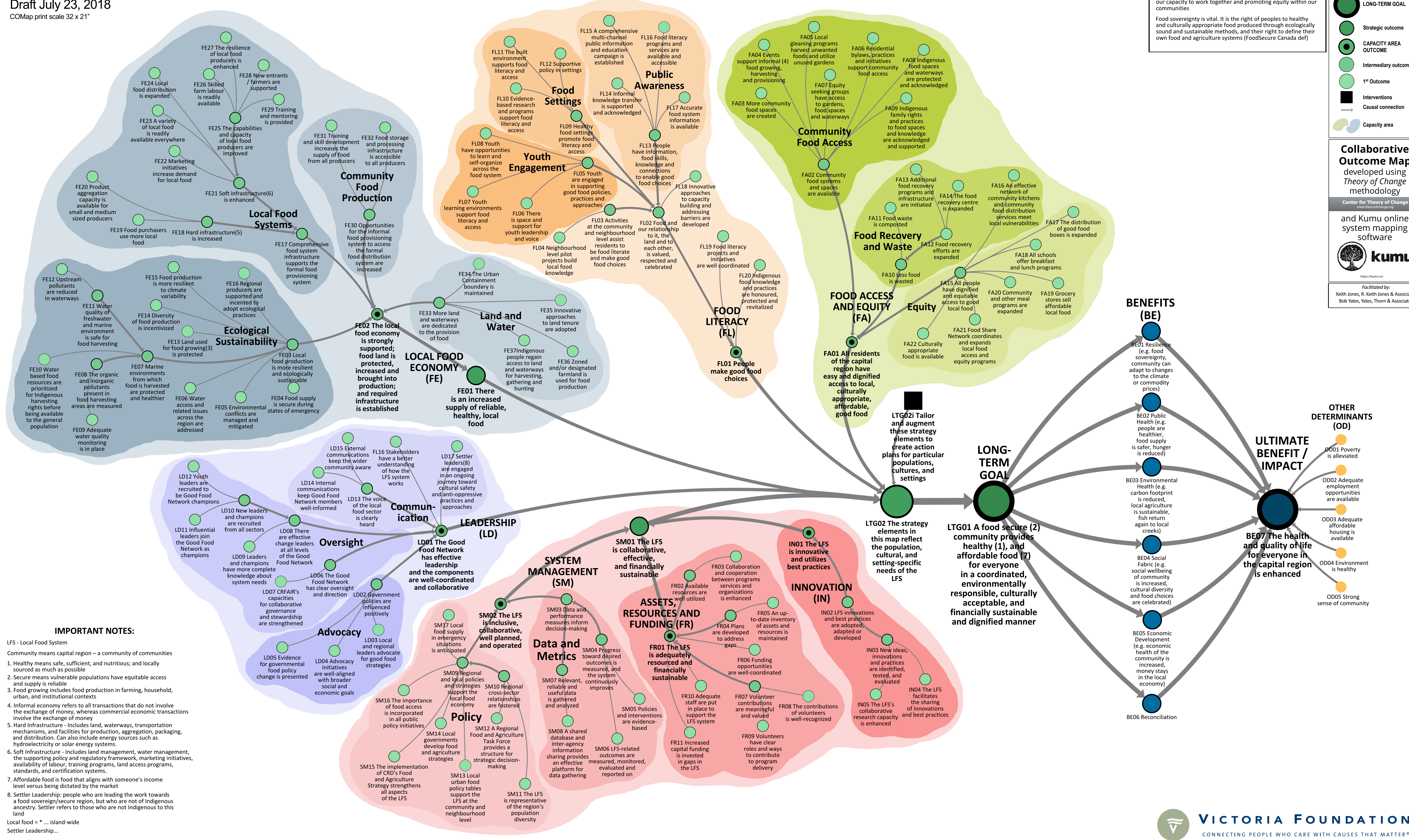

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IMPORTANT NOTES:

LFS - Local Food System

Community means capital region – a community of communities

- Healthy means safe, sufficient, and nutritious; and locally sourced as much as possible
- Secure means vulnerable populations have equitable access and supply is reliable
- Food growing includes food production in farming, household, urban, and institutional contexts
- Informal economy refers to all transactions that do not involve the exchange of money, whereas commercial economic transactions involve the exchange of money
- Hard Infrastructure - Includes land, waterways, transportation mechanisms, and facilities for production, aggregation, packaging, and distribution. Can also include energy sources such as hydroelectricity or solar energy systems.
- Soft Infrastructure - Includes land management, water management, the supporting policy and regulatory framework, marketing initiatives, availability of labour, training programs, land access programs, standards, and certification systems.
- Affordable food is food that aligns with someone's income level versus being dictated by the market
- Settler Leadership: people who are leading the work towards a food sovereign/secure region, but who are not of Indigenous ancestry. Settler refers to those who are not Indigenous to this land
